The Gathering – first video

Welcome - [OLIVER]

Grace and peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. **Amen.**

Early in the New Testament, we read about lots of people going out into the middle of nowhere to hear a preacher named John. That must have seemed strange to some. (What was wrong with the local minister?)

And yet here we are today, gathering in out-of-the-ordinary places, in unusual ways for a spiritual encounter. Out here on the frontiers of cyberspace, it may feel odd to one or two—like wearing an itchy coat or a diet that isn't familiar or ideal. But today's Gospel reminds us that in far-flung places—in the wilderness—God's Spirit is moving.

Welcome to this outpost of love in the year 2021.

Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father, Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; you are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer.

For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ,

with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

The Ministry of the Word – second video

GOSPEL: Mark 1:4-11 – [UCHE]

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. Glory to Christ our Saviour.

John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. He proclaimed, 'The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit.'

In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. And a voice came from heaven, 'You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased.'

Give thanks to the Lord for his glorious Gospel.

Praise to Christ our Lord.

Sermon [JOHN]

'And all the country of Judaea and all the people of Jerusalem went out to John and were baptised by him, confessing their sins.' Mk 1:5

It is not easy, after listening to Luke and Matthew's warmingly beautiful stories of shepherds and wise men – however hard we try to put them in their harsh political context – to catch the sheer wildness and disruptiveness of Mark's opening to his Gospel.

It's a story of mass desperation and panic: people pouring out of the city and the surrounding countryside into the desert to seek release, to escape from some terrifying threat, confessing their sins. It's a scene which is reminiscent of mediaeval reports from times of famine and plague: large groups of people roaming through Perugia, through the cities of Northern Italy, and Germany: whipping themselves mercilessly, confessing their sins, praying desperately for a route out of their distress.

Here, in Mark's account, the crowds flock to the ultimate Wild Man, John, clothed in camel hair, living off the land: locusts and wild honey, hoping against hope that here was some strange new way out. Flocking to a Wild Man who enacts a powerful ritual of death by drowning and restoration to new life, pointing them to a coming stronger one who will baptise them with the Holy Spirit.

It's one of those major breaks in history where the old is left behind and the new is still to come and people experience the acute expectations and deep anxieties of that which is not yet: the pull of the promised resolution and the horror of the present vacuum, of the void opening up before them. Everything which had previously provided security and direction is cast aside but the new order has not yet emerged, only prophets and dreamers – like John and, soon to be, Jesus.

This is a much more radical view of Jesus. There's no annunciation, no premonitory dreams, fulfilment of prophecies: Jesus just merges from the crowds and is baptised (did he like the

others confess his sins: we are not told). And then he experiences the new in a vision which will transform his life and the lives of all who follow him. The heavens are torn apart, the Spirit descends on him in the form of a dove, the divine voice calls to him appointing, anointing him and then the Spirit casts him out into the desert to find his vocation and mission.

40 days which changed the world, where Jesus' vision of Kingdom, of the coming new age was formed and begins to grow, where he wrestles with false hopes and fears and listens to the promptings of the Spirit.

As we take our first steps into the New and Epiphany-tide, it is hard not to feel that we have rarely in our lives faced such an uncertain future, full of threats and promises, false or real. So much of what we had come to accept as the norm, has been challenged, has become the subject of fierce and divisive controversy: our energy usage, our patterns of travel and consumption, the democratic principles by which we operate, the distribution of wealth across the world, our relations with other nations. And we have begun increasingly to see the consequences of those ways: the growth of megacities, climate change, whole regions locked in brutal conflict, appalling religious wars, unprecedented movements of population, with scenes of horror in the Mediterranenan and the Channel.

There will be many voices in the coming months, many who claim to be the stronger one, the one who will lead us out of these critical times. And we need to listen very carefully: where is wisdom to be found? Similar crises in the 1920's and '30s saw the emergence of stronger ones who brought further calamity and destruction.

Matthew has a relevant story for us. A few years after Jesus' baptism John is in prison – Herod has had enough of his wild destabilising of the nation. Jesus is preaching in Galilee. Can this be the one? John sends some of his people to him to ask if he is the one? Jesus replies: 'Tell John what you see and hear. The

blind see, the lames walk, lepers are healed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised and the poor have the gospel preached to them.

Many will come and promise the earth, world-beating changes, national renewal, health and prosperity, new energy sources, all this and much more. BUT who is it for? Who will benefit? Themselves, their group, however defined? Or the poor? The wretched of the earth? For if it is not for them, if it does not embrace even the poorest and most desperate it is not what we are looking for. The Kingdom of God is for all.

Intercessions [ROBERT]

Holy God, in the Baptism of Your Son, Jesus Christ, You reveal the nature of the children of God; we bring you our prayers as those who know ourselves as younger siblings of Your oldest Son.

We pray for the people of the United States of America, especially for those involved in political leadership. May they know themselves children of God, and joined as one human family in discerning your will.

We pray for your Church throughout the world: in the USA; The Anglican Church in Aotearoa, New Zealand and Polynesia. Within our diocese we pray for Bishop Kevin, and for the churches of St John the Evangelist, Dumfries, and St Margaret of Scotland, New Galloway. May your Church be a true symbol of your grace.

We pray for the Cathedral Church of St Mary's, for all the contacts and support that link us each as sisters and brothers in Christ. May those who give support know themselves held in the network of your love.

We pray for all health workers, for those who are giving themselves in caring for others during this Covid crisis. May they have courage and stamina, and may they know themselves valued by the nation they serve. We pray for our immediate community, remembering those who work in social care and with vulnerable groups; we pray for them the discernment and resources to support and care.

We pray for family and neighbours who celebrate or struggle at this time. For those who celebrate we pray joy and happiness, even amongst the restrictions of the present day; for those who struggle at this time, we pray courage and strength and the knowledge that they are not alone.

We thank you for those whose lives have shown us your presence in faith, and in their deaths have gone before us; in our Year's Mind today we remember Rose Elizabeth Bate.

May they Rest in peace, and rise in glory.

Holy God, we pray that we may know ourselves children of yours, through adoption and grace: may we work and pray as in Your Presence, brothers and sisters of Your son, Jesus Christ.
