# The Ministry of the Word

## 11 - GOSPEL: Mark 10:17-31 – [BILLY]

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.

**Glory to Christ our Saviour.**

As he was setting out on a journey, a man ran up and knelt before him, and asked him, ‘Good Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?’ Jesus said to him, ‘Why do you call me good? No one is good but God alone. You know the commandments: “You shall not murder; You shall not commit adultery; You shall not steal; You shall not bear false witness; You shall not defraud; Honour your father and mother.”’ He said to him, ‘Teacher, I have kept all these since my youth.’ Jesus, looking at him, loved him and said, ‘You lack one thing; go, sell what you own, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me.’ When he heard this, he was shocked and went away grieving, for he had many possessions.

Then Jesus looked around and said to his disciples, ‘How hard it will be for those who have wealth to enter the kingdom of God! And the disciples were perplexed at these words. But Jesus said to them again, ‘Children, how hard it is to enter the kingdom of God! It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God.’ They were greatly astounded and said to one another, ‘Then who can be saved?’ Jesus looked at them and said, ‘For mortals it is impossible, but not for God; for God all things are possible.’

Peter began to say to him, ‘Look, we have left everything and followed you.’ Jesus said, ‘Truly I tell you, there is no one who has left house or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or fields, for my sake and for the sake of the good news, who will not receive a hundredfold now in this age—houses, brothers and sisters, mothers and children, and fields, with persecutions—and in the age to come eternal life. But many who are first will be last, and the last will be first.’

Give thanks to the Lord for his glorious gospel  
**Praise to Christ our Lord.**

## 12 - Sermon [HELENA]

If today's Gospel makes us squirm a bit with discomfort, that's exactly what it is supposed to do. The rich young man comes to Jesus looking like the kind of man in posh adverts—he seems to have everything. On top of all that, he is a good man, diligently observing the commandments. What could possibly be missing?

Something pushes him to ask Jesus what more he must do to inherit eternal life, and Jesus looks at his pleading face and loves him. But there is one thing more thing he lacks, and that turns out to be a deal-breaker. Asked to give away everything to the poor and follow Jesus, he is shocked and grieved. He simply can't do it, and retreats.

It is a story that has caused massive discomfort ever since. St. Antony of Egypt took it quite literally, settling his temporal affairs and heading out into the desert. Centuries later St Francis of Assisi not only gave away all he had, but raided his father's warehouse, finally stripping naked before the bishop to prove his desire to follow Jesus. Countless others have followed them leaving all they have on the altar. It is a hard thing to do, but a wise old nun once said to me, 'To vow poverty and stand there with empty, open hands is not that hard, even comfortingly dramatic. The hard part is to keep from curling your fingers around to take it all back in penny packets.'

No wonder even Religious Communities squirm. Oh yes, they may take a vow of poverty, but mostly it means individual non-possession, not corporate destitution. Even then, everything from books and papers, craft supplies, to extra socks can be found in most cells or lockers.

Preachers try to wriggle out of this demand of Jesus. Give to the poor, help those who have less than you, be hospitable, but it can't possibly mean let go of everything.

Hold what you need and those you love with a loose grip. Don't get possessed by your possessions, they say. Be generous but look out for yourself and your loved ones! I knew a monastic who wrote her dissertation on the sheer impossibility of the vow of literal poverty.

How to reconcile this paradox without casuistically denying Jesus' call? After all, to amass great wealth while so many people are dying without food or shelter or even a change of clothes is obscene, though plenty of Christians do, even if they give some of it away. Just look at the tonnes of food and household goods even modest households waste daily. Look at the panic buying of everything from loo rolls to petrol. Fast fashion is just as bad as spending thousands of pounds on a designer outfit worn for a single occasion. Such waste robs the poor of goods, yes, but it also steals the very planet we live on from all of us.

But what if it isn't all about the money? What if that has less obvious implications? What if lurking there too subtly behind the gilded mask is another reading?

Wealth is shorthand for power, yes, but even more it is a pervasively toxic shorthand for coercion and control and a weird surrogate for security. So is wealth the rich young man's stumbling block, or is it fear? Fear of radical change. Fear of losing the control he has over his own circumstances, fear of the radical insecurity inherent in letting go of his goods and his comfort to pursue the unknown that Jesus offers—a promise that is both magnetic and repellent.

For all his obedience to religious law, our rich young man ultimately turns away because he lacks faith, lacks in fact trust which is the original meaning of faith.

He lacks faith not in some future vision of ‘pie in the sky when you die,’ but trust that Jesus’ call to a radical change in his outlook and way of life can be something better beyond his wildest dreams.

He is, in fact, very much like us as we hear the anguished cries not only of the poor but also of the burning, raped, poisoned, and drowning Earth. Vested interests in industry and commerce have convinced us that we cannot live in any other way except as collaborators in their fatal cycle, and they are not going to repair the damage to our world and ultimately to our souls.

Only we can do anything to effect change within and outwith ourselves. Only you and I can accept Christ’s invitation to leave our lack of trust behind and gamble all on his bright promise. That small example of faith we show can grow and multiply for the healing of the peoples and of our planet.

But it is too late to wait for others to act. It is past time to heed the Rabbinic question so like those of the Rabbi Jesus of Nazareth: ‘If not here, where? If not now, when? And if not me, who?’

I ask your prayers for all in our community who are vulnerable, whether because of ill-health, poverty or precarious circumstances. For social care workers, and all they do.

Pray for all in need in our city.

And: Give thanks to God for all in whom Christ has been honoured, especially those who have recently died.

until at last, in your new creation,  
we enter into our heritage  
in the company of the Virgin Mary,  
the apostles, and prophets,  
and of all God's children living and departed.**

with whom, and in whom,  
in the unity of the Holy Spirit,  
all honour and glory be to you,  
Lord of all ages,  
world without end.
