We ask this through him whose coming is certain, whose day draws near: your Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God for ever and ever. **Amen.** 

# The Ministry of the Word – second video

### GOSPEL: John 1.6-8, 19-27 – [RUTH]

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark. Glory to Christ our Saviour.

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light.

This is the testimony given by John when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, 'Who are you?' He confessed and did not deny it, but confessed, 'I am not the Messiah.' And they asked him, 'What then? Are you Elijah?' He said, 'I am not.' 'Are you the prophet?' He answered, 'No.' Then they said to him, 'Who are you? Let us have an answer for those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?' He said,

'I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness,

"Make straight the way of the Lord" ',

as the prophet Isaiah said.

Now they had been sent from the Pharisees. They asked him, 'Why then are you baptizing if you are neither the Messiah, nor Elijah, nor the prophet?' John answered them, 'I baptize with water. Among you stands one whom you do not know, the one who is coming after me; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandal.' This took place in Bethany across the Jordan where John was baptizing. Give thanks to the Lord for his glorious Gospel. **Praise to Christ our Lord.** 

#### Sermon [HELENA]

There is no getting around it. John the Baptist is an odd duck. Probably not quite so odd in his own day when the heritage of the prophets was still strong and would-be Messiahs were part of the landscape. Still, John cuts a charismatic figure, appearing in the wilds by the Jordan, a strange, lean hermit preaching and attracting crowds. Definitely someone the authorities should investigate.

Is he mad? Is he dangerous? Is he—gasp—the real thing, and if so, what sort of 'real thing' is he? Jerusalem launches an inquiry, sending priests and Levites asking questions: Who are you? Are you the Messiah? Are you Elijah? Are you the mysterious prophet people talk about? To all these John answers simply, 'I am not.' They remain frustrated even by his identification of himself as 'the voice of one crying out in the wilderness, "Make straight the way of the Lord". Obviously, his interrogators recognize the words of Isaiah, but why is he preaching and baptizing? What are his credentials? Even his enigmatic reference to a greater one who is both present and yet to come leaves them scratching their beards. These investigators are asking the wrong questions. Indeed, they would have done better to listen. But they are men who know things, men close to government and religious leaders, and they probe for what seems important to them, missing the message by dismissing the messenger.

Stay alert. Stay awake. Repent—turn around your understanding to greet the coming of the Anointed One. Do even John's devoted followers understand that repentance goes beyond apology for sin to oblige them to change not only themselves, but the relationships on which society is based? He is asking them to clear that road along which the Coming One will lead us to God's kingdom of true Liberty. We who have been blest by the teaching of the Law and the Prophets, by the example of Jesus Christ—do we understand? Do we understand that this peculiar time of chaos and upheaval opens a whole new way? Are we asking the right questions? Are we anticipating the inestimable wonder on offer, or are we so distracted by our wants and our sense of entitlement that we lose sight of the world's crying needs?

Looking around us it is easy to lose sight of that promise. It is not just businesses going bankrupt: thousands of people are jobless and hungry while others crash the websites of dying firms looking for bargains like vultures picking at a corpse. The very leadership who spent decades cutting social funding are paradoxically dispensing money like sticking plasters to hide the cancerous inequities increasingly exposed by pandemic and Brexit. We sorrow over missed carol services and family gatherings, planning who we can cram into the five-day Christmas bubble. Even the miraculous news of a Covid vaccine is greeted with modified rapture and debates over the fairness of its distribution. A septuagenarian is overheard muttering that the over-80s should just be left to die. And there are still people who believe safety measures are an affront to their personal freedom and selfishly endanger everyone else.

I love the beauties of Christmas Mass and lights and music as much as anyone. I enjoy the cosy company of friends with a mince pie in every hand. All of these are lovely, celebratory things, but they are not what Isaiah and John the Baptist meant. Without hearts open to the poor, the despised, the neglected; without a deep commitment to the radical reordering of our values and our actions all this can look a lot like 'normal' self-indulgence, not wonder.

My prayer in this Advent of the enforced stripping down of 'normal' customs we learn what to ask: not about traditions but the One who is coming; not about the messenger, but about how and for

Whom we are preparing. May we recognise and never lose or fail to share this wonder!

God, we wait for you. Come, and bring new healing to our world.

Come into our places of conflict and injustice and help us make straight the way of peace.

May they rest in peace, and rise in glory.

All this we ask in the name of the one for whom we wait, Jesus Christ.

This is my Blood of the new covenant; it is poured out for you, and for all, that sins may be forgiven. Do this in remembrance of me."

We now obey your Son's command. We recall his blessed passion and death, his glorious resurrection and ascension; and we look for the coming of his Kingdom. Made one with him, we offer you these gifts

# and with them ourselves, a single, holy, living sacrifice.

Hear us, most merciful Father, and send your Holy Spirit upon us and upon this bread and this wine, that, overshadowed by his life-giving power, they may be the Body and Blood of your Son, and we may be kindled with the fire of your love and renewed for the service of your Kingdom.

Help us, who are baptised into the fellowship of Christ's Body to live and work to your praise and glory; may we grow together in unity and love until at last, in your new creation, we enter into our heritage in the company of the Virgin Mary, the apostles, and prophets, and of all our brothers and sisters living and departed.

Through Jesus Christ our Lord, with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be to you, Lord of all ages, world without end.
