## The Ministry of the Word

#### **OLD TESTAMENT: 1 Samuel 15:34 - 16:13 - [MONICA]**

Samuel went to Ramah; and Saul went up to his house in Gibeah of Saul. Samuel did not see Saul again until the day of his death, but Samuel grieved over Saul. And the Lord was sorry that he had made Saul king over Israel.

The Lord said to Samuel, 'How long will you grieve over Saul? I have rejected him from being king over Israel. Fill your horn with oil and set out; I will send you to Jesse the Bethlehemite, for I have provided for myself a king among his sons.' Samuel said, 'How can I go? If Saul hears of it, he will kill me.' And the Lord said, 'Take a heifer with you, and say, "I have come to sacrifice to the Lord." Invite Jesse to the sacrifice, and I will show you what you shall do; and you shall anoint for me the one whom I name to you.' Samuel did what the Lord commanded, and came to Bethlehem. The elders of the city came to meet him trembling, and said, 'Do you come peaceably?' He said, 'Peaceably; I have come to sacrifice to the Lord; sanctify yourselves and come with me to the sacrifice.' And he sanctified Jesse and his sons and invited them to the sacrifice.

When they came, he looked on Eliab and thought, 'Surely the Lord's anointed is now before the Lord.' But the Lord said to Samuel, 'Do not look on his appearance or on the height of his stature, because I have rejected him; for the Lord does not see as mortals see; they look on the outward appearance, but the Lord looks on the heart.' Then Jesse called Abinadab, and made him pass before Samuel. He said, 'Neither has the Lord chosen this one.' Then Jesse made Shammah pass by. And he said, 'Neither has the Lord chosen this one.' Jesse made seven of his sons pass before Samuel, and Samuel said to Jesse, 'The Lord has not chosen any of these.' Samuel said to Jesse, 'Are all your sons

here?' And he said, 'There remains yet the youngest, but he is keeping the sheep.' And Samuel said to Jesse, 'Send and bring him; for we will not sit down until he comes here.' He sent and brought him in. Now he was ruddy, and had beautiful eyes, and was handsome. The Lord said, 'Rise and anoint him; for this is the one.' Then Samuel took the horn of oil, and anointed him in the presence of his brothers; and the spirit of the Lord came mightily upon David from that day forward. Samuel then set out and went to Ramah.

For the Word of God in Scripture, for the Word of God among us, **Thanks be to God**.

#### **GOSPEL:** Mark 4:26-34 – [MARC]

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark. Glory to Christ our Saviour.

He also said, 'The kingdom of God is as if someone would scatter seed on the ground, and would sleep and rise night and day, and the seed would sprout and grow, he does not know how. The earth produces of itself, first the stalk, then the head, then the full grain in the head. But when the grain is ripe, at once he goes in with his sickle, because the harvest has come.'

He also said, 'With what can we compare the kingdom of God, or what parable will we use for it? It is like a mustard seed, which, when sown upon the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on earth; yet when it is sown it grows up and becomes the greatest of all shrubs, and puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade.'

With many such parables he spoke the word to them, as they were able to hear it; he did not speak to them except in parables, but he explained everything in private to his disciples.

Give thanks to the Lord for his glorious Gospel.

Praise to Christ our Lord.

### Sermon [KELVIN]

I wonder whether you've ever tried online dating.

A few years ago I wouldn't even have thought to ask that question in a sermon as my presumption was that it wasn't a terribly mainstream activity.

I have learned though through listening to the hopes and fears of many people and through listening to the stories of those coming to get married that the online dating game has become very central to many people's lives and one of the ways that they think they will find happiness in life.

Given my public profile, it is an activity that is unlikely to work for me so all I know is second hand.

There are apps for this and for that. Apps that will sort your preferences from your peccadillos. Apps that will tell you who is out there. And apps that will tell you who is right here, right now and right ready to mess with your head.

And each works in a different way.

But some of the most common apps out there have a fairly simple premise – they show a picture of available matches and then invite the user to swipe left to reject them or swipe right according to whether or not they are attracted to them.

Left. Right. Left. Right.

Or perhaps just Left. Left. Left. Left.

I find it a curious way of beginning a relationship but I'm aware of no small number of people who would testify to the fact that it has worked for them.

Now, in our first bible reading this morning, we get something that resembles that kind of dating app.

There's no mobiles phones for God to use – just the prophet Samuel, whom God uses to choose the next King of Israel.

And they come before him one by one.

Eliab first.

But Samuel swipes left.

Then Abinadab.

But the answer is no.

Oddly in the middle of all this Samuel says that he's not judging based on appearances. But – well, they all say that, don't they?

Shammah is the next hopeful.

But it isn't to be Shammah.

And one by one all the sons of Jesse come forward. And one by one, Samuel rejects them.

Swipes left.

And we don't see them again.

Until the lovely David appears. Ruddy and handsome and with beautiful eyes.

And funnily enough, the Lord whispers to Samuel that this is the one.

Now, all of this takes place, remember, within the context of trying to find a new king to rule Israel – a project that was against God's best recommendations.

It was the people who wanted a king to rule over them.

Within the narrative experience of the biblical authors, they present a picture of God who really wants the people to have very different leadership indeed.

Sometimes it is priests – holy leaders who mediate the different ways that the people can get in touch with the divine.

Sometimes it is prophets – those who speak truth to whatever situation they are in.

Sometimes it is judges – those who embody wisdom in discerning the way for individuals and communities in disputes and in vocation.

To be honest there's a bit of a beauty parade going on in the bible for political systems, never mind a beauty parade for those who will run them.

Priests running things. The people swipe left.

Judges running things. The people swipe left.

Prophets running things? Well, prophets rarely get to run things and when they do nobody likes it anyway.

In the end the people get fed up.

Just give us a king and tell us what to do.

And that's how we get to Samuel picking a likely candidate from Jesse's sons.

Only when we get to David, the king with the twinkle in his eye do we get someone who satisfies Samuel – God's proxy voter.

The oil of plenty is cracked open and David is anointed mightily.

And it would be nice to say that they all lived happily ever after. Though if we read David's story we'll find it is a lot more interesting, complex, sad and glorious than anyone would guess on the day that he was anointed king by Samuel after all his elder brothers were rejected.

I must admit that I struggle with Samuel's conception of God and with his ideas of what God wants.

I find myself wanting to know more not just about Eliab and Abinadab and Shammah but about the rest of Jesse's children. And not just the boys either.

For this is the God I believe in. A God who values the gifts of all of them.

A God whose love is extravagant. Generous. And broad and deep and wide.

A God who already has a heart that is already matched with our own.

A God who is already interested in us – body and soul. The handsome and the not so handsome. Those who have a twinkle in the eye and those whose eyes are tired, or scared or weary or frightened too.

A God who always swipes right and never swipes left.

A God who says, I don't want you to be alone.

I will be with you through it all.

I have been with you through it all.

A God whose name and whose purpose is love.

You don't need an app. Nor the prophet Samuel anointing your head with oil.

You are already loved. More than you can know.

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.
