The Gathering – first video

Welcome - [KELVIN]

Grace and peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. **Amen.**

Hello and welcome to St Mary's Cathedral, Glasgow for this worship for the second Sunday of Epiphany. My name is Kelvin Holdsworth and I'm the Provost here.

At this time, most of us are not able to be here in church. But many have spoken to me of how important it is to see this place in these worship videos. Watching them each week feels like a gateway or a door or a window into being right here.

In Epiphany, we get gospel stories that work like that with heaven – glimpses, doorways, portals into eternity. God is revealed in Jesus – often suddenly and often unexpectedly.

Let this online gathering for worship today give us each a sense that God is present with us wherever we are. May we each experience our own little Epiphany of God's love and care.

Forgive us our sins, and deliver us from the power of evil, for the sake of your Son who died for us, Jesus Christ, our Lord.

[KELVIN] God, who is both power and love, forgive you and free you from your sins, heal and strengthen you by the Holy Spirit, and raise you to new life in Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

Gloria - [MORVEN]

Glory to God in the highest, and peace to his people on earth.

Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory.

Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father, Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; you are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer. For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

Collect - [KELVIN]

From our earliest days, O God, you call us by name.

Make our ears attentive to your voice, our spirits eager to respond, that, having heard you in Jesus your annointed one, we may draw others to be his disciples.

The Ministry of the Word – second video

GOSPEL: John 1.43-51 – [ROS]

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John. Glory to Christ our Saviour.

The next day Jesus decided to go to Galilee. He found Philip and said to him, 'Follow me.' Now Philip was from Bethsaida, the city of Andrew and Peter. Philip found Nathanael and said to him, 'We have found him about whom Moses in the law and also the prophets wrote, Jesus son of Joseph from Nazareth.' Nathanael said to him, 'Can anything good come out of Nazareth?' Philip said to him, 'Come and see.' When Jesus saw Nathanael coming towards him, he said of him, 'Here is truly an Israelite in whom there is no deceit!' Nathanael asked him, 'Where did you come to

know me?' Jesus answered, 'I saw you under the fig tree before Philip called you.' Nathanael replied, 'Rabbi, you are the Son of God! You are the King of Israel!' Jesus answered, 'Do you believe because I told you that I saw you under the fig tree? You will see greater things than these.' And he said to him, 'Very truly, I tell you, you will see heaven opened and the angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of Man.'

Give thanks to the Lord for his glorious Gospel.

Praise to Christ our Lord.

Sermon [OLIVER]

It's happened to everyone. You hear someone tell a story describing an event you were at but with details not precisely as you remember them. You listen carefully, but at some point—without thinking—your eyes dart left. Maybe your lip twists. You think, 'Is that what happened? I'm not sure that's right.' But perhaps you're mistaken.

All of us have different memories. Although we might like to think somewhere up there our minds contain a continuous record, our internal memoirs are more like camera snapshots, with details of the in-between filled in by our brains. Memories are constructed, and things can alter them. It's surprising how easily that can happen. Through others' suggestions, the sharing of different versions of an event, and the minds' amplification and embellishment, folk can clearly remember things that, in actuality, never happened.

Since the United States election, many have shared in hearing and telling a story about its outcomes. Over time, with repetition and details shared and enlarged, a false narrative developed of widespread voter fraud and misconduct. To some, the story has become so real they speak as if they believe it to be the most profound truth they know. They express themselves with conviction, specificity and passion, without any first-hand experience of the situation. It's a story told in vivid technicolour that never was.

It isn't just Trump supporters who believe they've seen something, who express themselves with such surety about the world. Others watched the attacks on the United States capitol in disbelief, claiming, 'This is not the real America.' As if saying it makes it true, they label Trump supporters who backed the attempted coup a minority fringe group—even though a bevy of data says otherwise.

Nathanael was sure nothing good could come from Nazareth. Often, it's that which resonates with us—what affirms our sneaking suspicions—we integrate into our worldview. We take the information available to us and use it to make meaning from where we are. Mostly, people see what's in front of them.

That's why I believe the key phrase from today's Gospel—the one we must pay attention to—is Philip's invitation: come and see. And the operative word here is 'come'. Come, because we do not see everything from where we are. Come, because we're going to have to change our viewing platform, shift from our current location, stir our minds. If we want to know what God is doing, we must be able to see more than what's here, in our own constructed realities and information bubbles.

Some of you might wonder if I'm stuck on repeat—like déjà vu. 'Does Oliver have more than one sermon, because I feel like I've heard this one before.' Indeed, you probably have heard something like this. Believe you me: I tried this week to think of something else. I prayed that God might reveal something other than a message it seems I've become obsessed with. Surely there was more to this sermon than three little words; but try as I might, I couldn't ignore them.

A few verses earlier in this Gospel, Jesus invited the two disciples who asked about him to 'Come and see'. Later, the woman who met Jesus at the well tells those in the city, 'Come and see'. People at the grave of Lazarus summoned Jesus to 'come and see' where they laid him. To get a glimpse of what was going on, folk had to get up. To understand what was being said, they had to move. I haven't cherry-picked a phrase from John's Gospel. 'Come and see' is a persistent refrain.

Here is where Christianity presents a radical idea. Some faiths—even some Christian practices of faith—may tell you, 'Everything you need to know is right in front of you. You don't need to go anywhere to discover what is true.' But read the Gospel. Jesus calls his disciples away. Indeed, Jesus himself is continuously on the move. Time and again, we read of people leaving the places they are to discover something new. It is the Way. Christianity isn't a sedentary faith. 'Follow me,' says Jesus.

None of us on this planet has the best seat in the house. Our view of the earth's farthest edge from where we stand isn't that distant. If we have to squint our eyes to shut out things we don't want to see, if we seek out alternative social media platforms that amplify viewpoints like ours, if we believe that only a small number of people know what's really going on in the world, maybe we should reposition ourselves to get another view. If something different is happening beyond what we know, perhaps it's time we come and see what it is.
