The Gathering

1 - Welcome - [AUDREY]

Grace and peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. **Amen.**

3 - Collect for Purity - [SHONA]

5 - Confession

[KELVIN] God is love and we are God's children. There is no room for fear in love. We love because God loved us first.

Let us confess our sins in penitence and faith.

[Silence]

God our Father, we confess to you and to our fellow members in the Body of Christ that we have sinned in thought, word and deed, and in what we have failed to do. We are truly sorry.

Forgive us our sins, and deliver us from the power of evil, for the sake of your Son who died for us, Jesus Christ, our Lord.

[AUDREY] God, who is both power and love, forgive you and free you from your sins, heal and strengthen you by the Holy Spirit, and raise you to new life in Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

7 - Gloria - [MORVEN]

Glory to God in the highest, and peace to his people on earth.

Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory.

Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father, Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; you are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer.

For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

The Ministry of the Word

11 - GOSPEL: Mark 10:35-45 - [LESLEY]

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark. Glory to Christ our Saviour.

James and John, the sons of Zebedee, came forward to him and said to him, 'Teacher, we want you to do for us whatever we ask of you.' And he said to them, 'What is it you want me to do for you?' And they said to him, 'Grant us to sit, one at your right hand and one at your left, in your glory.' But Jesus said to them, 'You do not know what you are asking. Are you able to drink the cup that I drink, or be baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with?' They replied, 'We are able.' Then Jesus said to them, 'The cup that I drink you will drink; and with the baptism with which I am baptized, you will be baptized; but to sit at my right hand or at my left is not mine to grant, but it is for those for whom it has been prepared.'

When the ten heard this, they began to be angry with James and John. So Jesus called them and said to them, 'You know that among the Gentiles those whom they recognize as their rulers lord it over them, and their great ones are tyrants over them. But it is not so among you; but whoever wishes to become great among you must be your servant, and whoever wishes to be first among you must be slave of all. For the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life a ransom for many.'

Give thanks to the Lord for his glorious gospel **Praise to Christ our Lord.**

12 - Sermon [PAULA]

I went through my school days with the same group of girls, from primary through to leaving secondary. One girl, Joanna, will be familiar to you, not because you went to my school but because we all know a Joanna. She was nice...actually she was more than nice, she was pretty, without being vain, responsible without being boring, clever without being boastful and effortlessly popular, more than nice, in fact, Joanna was great! And the thing is with greatness, even among schoolgirls, is that everyone around senses it and wants to be close. Perhaps we hoped it would rub off on us, but, sad to say, we girls competed, seriously competed to be close to Jo...the best Christmas card, the best birthday present, sit next to in class, be on the same sports team etc. We were, okay, I was, absolutely shameless in my pursuit of being close to someone I believed to be great.

Philip Larkin said that, "to be ambitious is to fall in love" and I think we were all just a little bit in love with Jo.

I think it was the same for James and John in our gospel reading this morning. Remember for a moment what sights and sounds these two fishermen had seen since they joined Jesus and consider then where they came from. James and John, sons of Zebedee were indeed fishermen, but they owned their own boat and as such they would have employed others. Fishing at that time was a good business, Lake Galilee was a rich fishing ground, much of their catch would have been pickled and exported, so these fishermen probably weren't the humble and subsistence fishermen we have come to believe. Add to that, in less than three years they had witnessed Jesus healing, walking on water, miraculously feeding thousands of people. They had heard Jesus teaching, in a new and exciting way, different from any other Rabbi, and they had recently witnessed, with Simon Peter, his transfiguration. To these ambitious fishermen, that wasn't the greatness of my schoolyard, that must have been mind-blowing!

James and John didn't really understand what Jesus was saying to them, they didn't understand his greatness, just that he was great. Just before our gospel reading, Jesus had foretold his death and resurrection for the third time. They didn't understand, despite Jesus telling them, that the cup he spoke of was one filled with vitriol, persecution and sour wine. They didn't understand that Jesus' true greatness would lay in his giving his life to serve and save us.

What James and John did understand was how much they wanted to be close to Jesus, what seems like naked ambition, was a love for Jesus that they could not at that stage articulate, other than in this desire to be near such greatness, the like none of us have ever seen.

It's entirely understandable that the other disciples, when hearing what James and John had asked of Jesus that they should be angry with the brothers, like my young self, I expect they all wanted to be at the side of Jesus in his glory.

I wonder if you, like me, ever emulated the people you thought were great, whether it was a friend or peer, a singer, or sports star, perhaps you copied their fashion or mannerisms? Because for the disciples, I think it was more than wanting to be near to Jesus' greatness, they wanted to emulate Jesus but weren't sure how, because as we've noted they didn't yet understand who Jesus was or the path he had to take.

The disciples' only reference for greatness before meeting Jesus were the Roman rulers at that time who were fiercely ambitious, Herod Agrippa even sought a royal title, while Governor Pilate was said to be a harsh, spiteful and brutal man. The kings of the OT they'd learnt of were autocratic with unlimited authority and no accountability, with affluent lifestyles, revered wherever they went.

Jesus gave them a new perspective on greatness which inverted all that they previously believed, that in order to be great, they had to become humble servants. So, whereas the Gentile rulers could and did do as they wished with the peoples under them, to emulate Jesus' greatness the disciples must serve the people, to be first among them, they had to be enslaved to all. Then Jesus told them again that his service would be to give his life for humanity.

Jesus' teaching about the greatness of service is a lesson for us all. True greatness isn't about ambition or competition it's about the

selflessness of love. Perhaps, we might dwell longer today on the words at the end of the service, "to go in peace to serve the Lord." Amen.

14 - Intercessions [ROBERT]

Let us pray for the coming of God's kingdom, saying O Lord, your kingdom come.

For the Church, your household and family: for the Church in the Province of the West Indies; for our colleague churches of All Saints' Bearsden and St Michael and All Angels Helensburgh; within the community of St Marys for the litter pickers and gardeners and cleaning and maintenance contractors, that God's people may be firm in the confession of their hope, we pray to you,

O Lord, your kingdom come.

For Kevin our Bishop, and for all who bear Christ's name; in their discernment of your way of being may their lives proclaim your glory, we pray to you,

O Lord, your kingdom come.

For those who are separated from us by death; in our years mind Alexander Jamieson and Charlotte Britton; for those who have shown us the path of service; that theirs may be the kingdom which is unshakeable, we pray to you,

O Lord, your kingdom come.

Glory and thanksgiving be to you, most loving Father, for the gift of your Son born in human flesh He is the Word existing beyond time, both source and final purpose, bringing to wholeness all that is made. Obedient to your will he died upon the Cross. By your power you raised him from the dead. He broke the bonds of evil and set your people free to be his Body in the world.

Hear us, most merciful Father, and send your Holy Spirit upon us and upon this bread and this wine, that, overshadowed by his life-giving power, they may be the Body and Blood of your Son, and we may be kindled with the fire of your love and renewed for the service of your Kingdom.

Help us, who are baptised into the fellowship of Christ's Body to live and work to your praise and glory; may we grow together in unity and love until at last, in your new creation, we enter into our heritage in the company of the Virgin Mary, the apostles, and prophets, and of all God's children living and departed.

Through Jesus Christ our Lord, with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be to you, Lord of all ages, world without end.
