The Gathering

1 - Welcome - [KELVIN]

Grace and peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. **Amen.**

My name is Kelvin Holdsworth and I'm the Provost here.

We hear today about Jesus saying to people – come away to a deserted place and rest a while.

Well, St Mary's isn't exactly a deserted place. We've been at the heart of the city even when the streets were quieter than they are now. But this is a place where people can come and rest and enjoy being with God however busy their lives are.

So, let us gather in peace and in joy and meet the one who invites us to rest.

3 - Collect for Purity - [CAITLIN]

Forgive us our sins, and deliver us from the power of evil, for the sake of your Son who died for us, Jesus Christ, our Lord.

[KELVIN] God, who is both power and love, forgive you and free you from your sins, heal and strengthen you by the Holy Spirit, and raise you to new life in Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

7 - Gloria - [MAGNUS]

Glory to God in the highest, and peace to his people on earth.

Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory.

Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father, Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; you are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer.

For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

8 - Collect - [KELVIN]

Compassionate God, from far and near you gather your Church into one. Safeguard the unity of your flock through the teaching of Christ the Shepherd, that all your scattered children may find in him the guidance and nourishment they seek. We ask this through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God for ever and ever. **Amen.**

The Ministry of the Word

11 - GOSPEL: Mark 6:30-34, 53-56 - [DAVID]

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark. Glory to Christ our Saviour.

The apostles gathered around Jesus, and told him all that they had done and taught. He said to them, 'Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while.' For many were coming and going, and they had no leisure even to eat. And they went away in the boat to a deserted place by themselves. Now many saw them going and recognized them, and they hurried there on foot from all the towns and arrived ahead of them. As he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things.

When they had crossed over, they came to land at Gennesaret and moored the boat. When they got out of the boat, people at once recognized him, and rushed about that whole region and began to bring the sick on mats to wherever they heard he was. And wherever he went, into villages or cities or farms, they laid the sick in the market-places, and begged him that they might touch even the fringe of his cloak; and all who touched it were healed.

Give thanks to the Lord for his glorious Gospel. **Praise to Christ our Lord.**

12 - Sermon [OLIVER]

One might wonder if today's gospel is an instance of 'do as I say, not as I do'. Forasmuch as Jesus seems to value rest, in the passages we've read, he doesn't take it. Jesus planned an escape to a deserted place; but that place turned out to be not so deserted, and Jesus found himself at work. Gennesaret wasn't any kind of getaway either. Wherever Jesus went, into villages or cities or farms, people begged that they might meet him, and Jesus did. While many preachers will talk this day about rest and recovery, the truth is that the glimpses we get in this reading don't bear out that custom. Work takes precedence for Jesus.

A modern-day life coach might have some things to say about Jesus' work-life balance. In these accounts, Jesus didn't stick to the boundaries set. And you know what? The Gospels record many other instances of this, too—from hanging out with the wrong kinds of people to not following rules about ritual cleanliness to working on the Sabbath. Sometimes the things Jesus is supposed to do to live a well-ordered and balanced life aren't the things he does. So, what's this all about?

Recently, I read an article features writer Bryan Lufkin wrote for the BBC. He highlighted a report from two researchers—one in France and the other in the UK. Their 2020 study looked at two groups of employees in middle or senior management roles. One faction avoided working long hours; the other didn't. The researchers identified a common trait among those who rejected long hours: reflexivity. One of the researchers described the steps toward identifying and implementing ways of working and living as taking 'mental space to gain clarity'.¹

Researchers cited in the BBC article talked about flexible habits. Rather than seeking homeostasis, those looking to have healthy working practices accommodate the shifting ground of real life. Things change, our feelings change and what we find enjoyable changes, too. Simply setting up boundaries that don't adjust to our viewpoints and experiences does not bring harmony.

But is this a slippery slope? There will always be something to divert our attention, some angle to pursue, more work to be done. If we're constantly moving the goalposts of our leisure time, will we

ever find rest? There's so much broken and hurting in our world, with all kinds of people demanding our attention and time. If we never say 'no', perhaps we'll wind up with nothing left to give.

As I read it, these behavioural scientists are not urging folk to live a life without boundaries. And I don't think it's what Jesus is demonstrating either. Instead, we're talking about being present, awake to what's happening and how we are feeling. It is the kind of life in which we identify what needs doing, what needs adjusting and what needs leaving alone.

Many of us (myself included) schedule downtime only to find it isn't that refreshing or restorative. On paper, it's supposed to work; but we show up for our leisure period, and our minds are somewhere else. We hope that scheduling the time and then taking it will balance things out, but it doesn't. That's because balance isn't an aim to achieve. It isn't a target we hit and then we're done.

If you can, try this. Close your eyes and stand on one foot. (I never stop being surprised at how difficult this is.) Once you find your equilibrium, you may be fine for a bit. But stay there. Eventually, you'll start to feel a wobble, and you'll have to adjust, using minor movements to maintain stability. After a while, you'll need even greater muscle involvement—maybe you'll have to use your arms. Then, discover how much easier this whole enterprise is if you open your eyes. That's how it is with balance in human beings. It's only as good as the instant you've set it, and it's better when you can see.

It seems the way of living a balanced life is responsive and adaptive. As we seek our centre, we must pay attention and recalibrate along the way. If rest is important (and indeed it should be), we must pursue it, but not as some ambition or formula. Instead, we must remain alert and attentive to what's going on around us and find our rest over and over again.

For the Church, your household and family; for the Anglican Church of Rwandafor the Drumchapel Ecumenical Partnership and All Saints, Jordanhillfor all who volunteer at St Mary's that God's people may be firm in the confession of their hope, we pray to you,

O Lord, your kingdom come.

For Kevin our Bishop, and for all who bear Christ's name; that their lives may proclaim your glory, we pray to you, O Lord, **your kingdom come.**

For those who are separated from us by death; For Florence Canning and Clifford Heskin, whose year's mind falls at this time,

that theirs may be the kingdom which is unshakeable, we pray to you,

O Lord, your kingdom come.

Merciful Father, accept these prayers for the sake of your Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ. **Amen.**

We now obey your Son's command. We recall his blessed passion and death, his glorious resurrection and ascension; and we look for the coming of his Kingdom. Made one with him, we offer you these gifts and with them ourselves, a single, holy, living sacrifice.

Hear us, most merciful Father, and send your Holy Spirit upon us and upon this bread and this wine, that, overshadowed by his life-giving power, they may be the Body and Blood of your Son, and we may be kindled with the fire of your love and renewed for the service of your Kingdom.

Help us, who are baptised into the fellowship of Christ's Body to live and work to your praise and glory; may we grow together in unity and love until at last, in your new creation, we enter into our heritage in the company of the Virgin Mary, the apostles, and prophets, and of all God's children living and departed.

Through Jesus Christ our Lord, with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be to you, Lord of all ages, world without end.

As we gaze in adoration we feed on God in our hearts and minds that we may in turn feed the world.

O God, even as this broken bread was scattered over the hills, and was gathered together and became one, so let Your Church be gathered together from the ends of the earth into your kingdom; for yours is the glory and the power through Jesus Christ for ever. **Amen.**

24 - Post Communion Prayer - [CAITLIN]

O God, as we are strengthened in these holy mysteries, may our lives be a continual offering, holy and acceptable in your sight; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

25 - Blessing - [KELVIN]

It has been good to gather today with one another and with those who first gathered with Jesus for rest and renewal. My prayer today is that the deep peace of God will go with you every day of this week and bless all whom you encounter.

So, the peace of God which passes all understanding , keep your hearts and minds in the knowledge and love of God, and of his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord: And the blessing of God almighty, the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, be among you and remain with you always. Amen.
