Gloria - [GERALDINE]

Glory to God in the highest, and peace to his people on earth.

Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory.

Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father, Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; you are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer.

For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

The Ministry of the Word – second video

Reading: Exodus 33:12-23 - [MACKENZIE]

A reading from the Book of Exodus

Moses said to the Lord, "See, you have said to me, 'Bring up this people'; but you have not let me know whom you will send with me. Yet you have said, 'I know you by name, and you have also found favor in my sight.' Now if I have found favor in your sight, show me your ways, so that I may know you and find favor in your sight. Consider too that this nation is your people." He said, "My presence will go with you, and I will give you rest." And he said to him, "If your presence will not go, do not carry us up from here. For how shall it be known that I have found favor in your sight, I and your people, unless you go with us? In this way, we shall be distinct. I and your people, from every people on the face of the earth." The Lord said to Moses, "I will do the very thing that you have asked; for you have found favor in my sight, and I know you by name." Moses said, "Show me your glory, I pray." And he said, "I will make all my goodness pass before you, and will proclaim before you the name, 'The Lord'; and I will be gracious to whom I will be gracious, and will show mercy on whom I will show mercy. But," he said, "you cannot see my face; for no one shall see me and live." And the Lord continued, "See, there is a place by me where you shall stand on the rock; and while my glory passes by I will put you in a cleft of the rock, and I will cover you with my hand until I have passed by; then I will take away my hand, and you shall see my back; but my face shall not be seen."

GOSPEL: Matthew 22:15-22 - [OLIVER]

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mathew. Glory to Christ our Saviour.

Then the Pharisees went and plotted to entrap him in what he said. So they sent their disciples to him, along with the Herodians, saying, 'Teacher, we know that you are sincere, and teach the way of God in accordance with truth, and show deference to no one; for you do not regard people with partiality. Tell us, then, what you think. Is it lawful to pay taxes to the emperor, or not?' But Jesus, aware of their malice, said, 'Why are you putting me to the test, you hypocrites? Show me the coin used for the tax.' And they brought him a denarius. Then he said to them, 'Whose head is this, and whose title?' They answered, 'The emperor's.' Then he said to them, 'Give therefore to the emperor the things that are the emperor's, and to God the things that are God's.' When they heard this, they were amazed; and they left him and went away.

Give thanks to the Lord for his glorious Gospel.

Praise to Christ our Lord.

Sermon [OLIVER]

Jesus predicted an upheaval, a change in order. At the start of his ministry, he warned people, 'The kingdom of God is at hand.' It was a revolution. To many, this was welcome news. They were ready for the hoped-for Messiah to overthrow the oppressive Roman establishment and restore power to a disenfranchised people.

So, some asked this rebel leader, 'What should we do with this corrupt and tyrannical regime? Surely, we shouldn't finance it. We should refuse to participate in this racket. They've asked us to pay

taxes to underwrite our very domination.' Government and its influences were a severe threat.

Many people today may operate from a similar place of distrust. Folk are angry, tired, and fed-up. Some say it's time for revolutionary measures. Governments make policies for faceless herds, without regard for personal human dignity—rights set aside, and liberties ploughed over. It seems no one in power has the interest of others at heart.

So it may be no wonder that when asked to do things like wear a mask, maintain social distancing or avoid large gatherings, some see it as another element of oppression—an out-of-touch ruling-class getting it wrong. Folk ask, 'How could a government that doesn't seem concerned about me or the things I think are important now all of a sudden pretend to care?'

In their suspicion and anger, some refuse to cooperate with what they see as excessive rules. Non-compliance is a demonstration of independence in a system of subjugation and repression. Others do it—but only halfway, wearing a mask that dangles below the nose or choosing to attend events or gather with others whenever it suits them. It is—perhaps subconsciously—an expression of apathy. 'I've done enough. This is all the cares I've got to give.'

Is this what righteous rebellion looks like?

I don't think so, and I don't think Jesus thought so either. Jesus did not answer the question posed to him about paying taxes to the Roman Empire with militant zeal, nor did he answer it with indifference. He knew his interrogators were playing a game. Instead, Jesus reminds us of what the cause worth fighting for is.

God's kingdom incorporates all creation. It incapacitates tyranny not through destruction but with imaginative vision and compassion. In this jurisdiction, every human heart is a sign of God's presence.

I believe in revolution. I believe in radical change, but I'm trying my best not to become radicalised. It's easy to think—in the wake of

so much wrong and misinformation—that everyone has an ulterior motive. All kinds of people start to look like the enemy. But I'm striving not to be blinded. I'm trying to maintain a healthy level of wariness without veering toward nihilism.

But make no mistake about it: bad actors are thriving on schism and paranoia. They're purchasing social media airtime and influence to stoke the flames of an already burning fire. In a culture of fear and disharmony, they're hoping we'll give up—give up on things like unity, equality, and kindness. And many are. Folk are ceasing to care—no longer listening or evaluating, because what's the point? Don't bother. Lose hope. Don't even vote.

Is that a win for the kingdom? Is that a win for citizens of God's eternal city?

Now, don't get me wrong. We should be doubtful of what comes out of the mouths of people who've shown themselves to be unworthy of our trust. We should question frequently. But we must use our own eyes to see. Don't let rebellion rob us of our common sense. Don't let our zeal disabuse us of the notion that the health and wellbeing of everyone is important.

Someone brought a rebel leader a mask and asked, 'What should we do with this'—a tool used to limit freedoms, a regulation set by the government without our choice. The leader asked to see the mask, and they brought it to her. Then she said to them, 'Whom does this mask benefit?' And someone in the crowd said, 'Some say the wearer.' And another said, 'Well, some say it could benefit other people, too.' The rebel leader paused, and held up the mask and said, 'Give therefore to humankind the things that come from wearing a mask, and give the government a rebellion, against the things that destroy, damage and malign the human race.'

in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be to you, Lord of all ages, world without end.
