[KELVIN] God, who is both power and love, forgive you and free you from your sins, heal and strengthen you by the Holy Spirit, and raise you to new life in Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

Gloria - [MORVEN]

Glory to God in the highest, and peace to his people on earth.

Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory.

Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father, Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; you are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer.

For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

The Ministry of the Word – second video

GOSPEL: John 15:1-8 – [CHRIS]

Alleluia, alleluia! Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

Glory to Christ our Saviour.

Jesus said, 'I am the true vine, and my Father is the vine-grower. He removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit. You have already been cleansed by the word that I have spoken to you. Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing. Whoever does not abide in me is thrown away like a branch and withers; such branches are gathered, thrown into the fire, and burned. If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples.'

Give thanks to the Lord for his glorious Gospel. **Praise to Christ our Lord. Alleluia!**

Sermon [OLIVER]

Over the last year, people in the UK have spent billions of pounds renovating their homes. Santander reported the submission of over 60,000 planning applications during the first period of lockdown.¹ Gardens have been the most popular area to renovate, followed by living room, bedroom and kitchen projects.² Joe and I are represented in these statistics. We now have a new mustard (although Joe says it's actually mango) accent wall in our lounge.

Staying home has changed how we see the places we live—mainly because we're spending a whole lot more time in them. When asked why renovators chose to invest in their living spaces, 'almost two-thirds said it was to make their home feel comfortable'.³ Folk have reimagined what and where leisure space looks like.

Of course, staying home has changed more than people's decor. Scientists reckon stay-at-home orders, when implemented, dramatically decrease the spread of COVID. Avoiding going out saves lives. It has protected entire countries' populations, and unfortunately, not staying home has had deleterious effects.

In today's Gospel, Jesus talks about staying home, using the image of a vine as our connection to God, our root. And in the time to come, when Jesus' disciples will venture out into the world on their own, they will need to stay attached to it. He tells his disciples to abide, to make their home with God, to be home-loving people.

This past week, the Provost and I were talking about the easing of restrictions over recent days. With things opening back up, pubs, restaurants and shops in the city were abuzz with activity, preparing for a new influx of custom. 'You know, though,' said Kelvin, 'I find myself feeling a little nostalgic.' Shocked, I was like, 'Nostalgic about what? Lockdown?' And to my surprise, Kelvin talked about the past year giving him a new appreciation for the simple life.

I must admit I'm probably not much one for the simple life by nature. It's not that I enjoy things complicated, but sitting at home is not my idea of a good time. I like exploring, going out. I don't particularly appreciate staring at the same four walls for too long.

And I reckon that for many other people with itchy feet, they—like me—are eager to put the homebody life behind them.

But I wonder, in light of today's Gospel and in respect of our recent pandemic experiences, if we're about to run out the door too quickly. Is the Provost right? Is there wisdom we can find in our housebound experiences?

One of the things that's struck me about the survey data coming out in recent reports is that even as orders enforcing lockdown ease, people say they plan to spend more time at home. Our home renovation projects—both large and small—have highlighted the importance of where we live. Perhaps there's something to this.

For a lot of people, this past year has felt like an unholy wasteland. They've not felt connected to a church or a community of faith, and hence they've felt disconnected from God. Online Worship doesn't do it for them, and the new mediated forms of in-person worship feel cold and sterile. 'Staying at home', spiritually, has been off-putting. They've been trapped inside in a room that doesn't feel anything like shelter or refuge.

On one hand, we could wait until we return to normal and find ourselves back in the adventuresome world of the things that used to give us spiritual nourishment. But we could see that, even then, we sense a bit of un-rootedness, detachment from it all. That wouldn't be surprising.

This pandemic has uncovered our interior lives and forced us to live in secluded places. And it's from those places—the life of personal prayer and devotion—everything else emanates. What happens in private, behind closed doors is the root. Our walks with God, our meditations, our private prayers are deep and integral to spiritual life. And maybe, in periods of busyness, that isn't so apparent. But during these extended stay-at-home measures, this has all come to the fore.

It seems we've got work to do in our homes—the places where we live, both physical and spiritual. Of course, these places may need more than a lick of paint or a new houseplant. That will be for us to discover. Nonetheless, we've seen during this pandemic that our interior dwellings need upkeep and renewal. We must care for where we live. So, before we go rushing headlong back into church, perhaps we should take a look at where we are now and give our spiritual homes the attention they deserve.

After supper, he took the cup, he offered you thanks, and gave it to them saying: "Drink this, all of you. This is my Blood of the new covenant; it is poured out for you, and for all, that sins may be forgiven. Do this in remembrance of me."

We now obey your Son's command. We recall his blessed passion and death, his glorious resurrection and ascension; and we look for the coming of his Kingdom. Made one with him, we offer you these gifts and with them ourselves, a single, holy, living sacrifice.

Hear us, most merciful Father, and send your Holy Spirit upon us and upon this bread and this wine, that, overshadowed by the Spirit's life-giving power, they may be the Body and Blood of your Son, and we may be kindled with the fire of your love and renewed for the service of your Kingdom.

Help us, who are baptised into the fellowship of Christ's Body to live and work to your praise and glory; may we grow together in unity and love until at last, in your new creation, we enter into our heritage in the company of the Virgin Mary, the apostles, and prophets, and of all our brothers and sisters living and departed.

Through Jesus Christ our Lord, with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be to you, Lord of all ages, world without end.
