Welcome - [KELVIN]

Grace and peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

Hello and welcome to the online worship from St Mary's Cathedral, Glasgow. My name is Kelvin Holdsworth and I'm the provost here.

This week, we continue to meet the Risen Christ. He appears to the disciples in unexpected places - in this week's gospel, meeting them on a road as they walk.

In keeping with that theme, some of the pictures that we will see during this service will be photographs that members of the congregation have taken around the city.

Most streets are much quieter than usual. God surprised the first disciples in the ways that Jesus appeared to them. And God is surprising us week by week as we meet in ways previously unimagined. The same risen Jesus Christ will meet us wherever we are today.

The Ministry of the Word – second video

Gospel - [JO RUSSELL]

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

Glory to Christ our Saviour.

Now on that same day two of them were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, and talking with each other about all these things that had happened. While they were talking and discussing, Jesus himself came near and went with them, but their eyes were kept from recognizing him. And he said to them, 'What are you discussing with each other while you walk along?' They stood still, looking sad. Then one of them, whose name was Cleopas, answered him, 'Are you the only stranger in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have taken place there in these days?' He asked them, 'What things?' They replied, 'The things about Jesus of Nazareth, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, and how our chief priests and leaders handed him over to be condemned to death and crucified him. But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things took place. Moreover, some women of our group astounded us. They were at the tomb early this morning, and when they did not find his body there, they came back and told us that they had indeed seen a vision of angels who said that he was alive. Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said; but they did not see him.' Then he said to them, 'Oh, how foolish you are, and how slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have declared!

Give thanks to the Lord for his glorious Gospel.

Praise to Christ our Lord.

Sermon [OLIVER]

What is 'resurrection'? Well, I suppose it depends on who you ask. The Gospel presents several descriptions of experiences of resurrection. There's the experience of an empty tomb with folded graveclothes. There's the experience of Mary, seeing someone she supposed was the gardener, only to recognise him as Jesus when he called her name. And there's the account from today's Gospel. It tells of a meeting with a stranger on the road, only recognised by the disciples as the risen Lord when he broke bread and gave it to them. In the Gospel stories, people had different experiences of the same thing.

There are different experiences people are having now of the same thing. We're not sure of an exact number of COVID-19 cases, but for those for which we have confirmed diagnoses, people have different stories of their encounters. Some people report only a mild cough. Others recount having had symptoms of nasty flu. And still, others find themselves in Intensive Care wards, on a ventilator, fighting for their lives. It's the same thing—the same virus—but people experience it—for whatever reason—differently.

Some are asking themselves, 'Have I had the virus already?' or 'Do I have it now?' There are no clear answers to these questions while self-isolating at home. In fact, for some, symptoms may disappear just as mysteriously as they appeared. 'Was that Coronavirus?' they'll wonder, and it may be some folk will never know if what they had was COVID-19 or something else.

Therefore, some conclude this must be a dream; it must be made up. Some call this whole thing a hoax. If there's no consensus, maybe it doesn't exist. If there's not one, universal experience and

definition, no precise, uncluttered explanation, there must be no such thing as Coronavirus.

That strikes me as a feeble understanding of biology. For, there is considerable genetic variation in our species. In our strands of DNA, clear communication doesn't always happen. Not every gene gets the same message or interprets it the same way. And *people* respond differently, too. I don't just mean some people will emotionally react differently to different stimuli. I mean that *physically* people, as organisms, will react and respond to things differently. For some, this virus will not take to their bodies. For others, it will take them down.

Understandably, folk are struggling to make sense of what's happening. There aren't clear, unequivocal answers right now. There are good theories, and there's proper research going on, but there are also a lot of different reports and responses. Our Gospel stories present a similar scenario in the aftermath of Jesus' death. People struggled with resurrection—what it looked like, how it worked. Why didn't the disciples recognise their best friend and teacher when they saw him? Why did folk struggle to talk about what happened? Why hasn't this happened again? The disciples might have asked themselves, 'Did I dream that? Was this some kind of projection?' And those are legitimate questions.

The questions we have of something or the variance it has from our expectations or own experiences does not mean that something didn't happen. Just because we don't understand something, or it's complicated and requires a considerable amount of investigation doesn't mean it isn't something worth examining ... and even taking seriously. And I submit to you that this—all of it—is worth taking seriously. The meaning of this life, our present situation, and how we got here deserves real engagement, not turning our heads away from what is going on.

People's experience of the resurrected Christ differs—just like so many things. We could choose to disregard the complexity of it, its

contradictions and incomprehensibility. We could seek to define something narrowly by only one manifestation and expression. We could imagine this whole experience as one big practical joke. Yes, we could ... but I, for one, will not.

To dismiss something out of hand for lack of harmony and unanimity of vision is to deny the reality of how the world works in our human experience. There are no easy answers, and if that's what you're looking for, you're going to struggle with a lot of things ... not least of which is resurrection. For it, along with God, cannot be so narrowly defined as to make no room for surprises or variance or transformation. Just because we don't fully understand something does not mean it's a con.

Intercessions

Holy God you meet us on the roadside, in the unexpected welcome and the wisdom of the stranger. We pray that our minds and our hearts may be open to your vision and truth.

Holy God, we bring you our prayers for the world, in which our familiar patterns are turned upside down. In a world of plenty and of deep need, we pray for your vision in decisions about future economic plans.

Holy God, we pray for your church, called to witness 'Were not our hearts burning within us'. We pray for the Episcopal church in Jerusalem and the Middle East. Within our diocese we pray for Bishop Mark, Primus, and for Kevin, Bishop elect, for the people of Saint Cuthbert's Church, Cambuslang, and Saint Mark's, East Kilbride, the Reverend Paul Fletcher; and for the Mothers Union and Jill Cameron. We pray for the Student group within St Marys. As we find new ways of being community, may we remember You meet us.

Holy God you meet us in our neighbours, family and friends. We pray for those who celebrate at this time, for some whose celebrations are quieter than they would have planned; in their new

occasions may they know your joy. We pray for those who are struggling with new situations, poor health or loss; we pray that they may know that you walk with them.

Holy God we pray for those that serve our community in Police, Fire, Rescue and Ambulance services, for the personnel of the Armed Forces, and chaplains on active service. May they know themselves supported and valued by the wider community; and may they find in encounters along the road your strength and your vision.

Thank you for those whose lives have shown us vision and hope, meetings with whom have been as with the Christ on the way; in our Year's Mind together we name George Downes and James Mann.

May they rest in peace and rise in glory.

God of New Life, may we find the Risen Christ in the people we meet on the road; those that walk alongside us for a time, and those who walk a different way; may our hearts be warmed by your word.
