11 - GOSPEL: John 18:33-37 – [ROBIN]

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.
Glory to Christ our Saviour.

‘There will be signs in the sun, the moon, and the stars, and on the earth distress among nations confused by the roaring of the sea

and the waves. People will faint from fear and foreboding of what is coming upon the world, for the powers of the heavens will be shaken. Then they will see “the Son of Man coming in a cloud” with power and great glory. Now when these things begin to take place, stand up and raise your heads, because your redemption is drawing near.’

Then he told them a parable: ‘Look at the fig tree and all the trees; as soon as they sprout leaves you can see for yourselves and know that summer is already near. So also, when you see these things taking place, you know that the kingdom of God is near. Truly I tell you, this generation will not pass away until all things have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away.

‘Be on guard so that your hearts are not weighed down with dissipation and drunkenness and the worries of this life, and that day does not catch you unexpectedly, like a trap. For it will come upon all who live on the face of the whole earth. Be alert at all times, praying that you may have the strength to escape all these things that will take place, and to stand before the Son of Man.’

12 - Sermon [HELENA]

Be alert. Read the signs of the times. Pray. The words of today’s Gospel are the traditional call for the beginning of Advent, that multi-textured season in which we are invited to consider both the end of all things and the new beginning that is already and is about to come with the Incarnation of Christ

That might be paradox enough to deal with. Indeed, it may have been easier to comprehend in Jesus’ day, when people were more attuned to the rhythms of nature, and the seasons flowed one into another, seed-time and harvest. Not that natural disasters did not happen, they did, and were as frightening then as they are now, if less scientifically understood. But they were part of a wider

tapestry of all living things whose warp and weft wove all things together. Disruptions meant more because of that underlying pattern. Even excruciating tragedies like plague, famine, and conquest were part of life, and so was joy at new birth, an excellent harvest, or a long season of peace.

We have lost that connection, that sense of everything and everyone (even perceived enemies) being related. We have landed in our own place of paradox.

We know so much more about the workings of our world and society, and we have at our disposal such a glut of information, misinformation, and disinformation that even with the best intentions it is hard to keep alert in the blizzard of data overload. Even the popularity of the 'mindfulness' movement is all too often a paradoxical escape from temporal reality.

The most obvious escapists are those who buy into denial of disaster and conspiracy theories to explain whatever they conceive of as a plot against their freedoms, indulging in behaviour that endangers themselves and others in the name of that illusory freedom. Sadly, the need to limit contact with others has turned many of us inward, making our own desires loom larger than the needs of other people or indeed the planet.

Others blame anyone but ourselves for our problems, lamenting the masses of unfillable jobs that are directly related to the xenophobia that causes such shortages. Leaders of nations from America to the UK, Poland, Lithuania, and many others speak with impunity of 'armies of migrants massed on our borders', while turning firehoses on freezing refugees from war and torture or planning detentions in prison-like camps, proposing to dump them like refuse in someone else's country, the latest being Albania!

The earth itself is protesting more obviously than even the thousands of marchers who want to save it. Melting ice from the poles is inundating low-lying countries, shrinking of glaciers in the most majestic of mountains leads to drought, wildfires, and famine.

Changing weather patterns drown our towns or bury them under mudslides or eradicate them with almost unstoppable wildfires.

God made us out of nothing but love to be a part of the exquisite organism of creation, like any other part inextricably related to the whole. When one dies, we all die a little, and when one is saved, so are we all. But this creation, like the fabled Garden of Eden has its own sweet-talking Serpent of human selfishness, and from very early in our history we have talked ourselves out of cooperative relationship into the illusion of dominance and control.

We have denied our interdependence, we have 'othered' and commodified nature, its gifts, and the lives and aspirations of our fellow human beings. What cannot be used for our personal comfort and convenience seemingly no longer matters except as a threat to our cosily encapsulated 'comfort zones', a threat to be ignored or eradicated. Can there possibly be any gift or opportunity in these perceived threats and inconveniences?

Yes, we are beloved children of God, but does not the loving God who made us weep for our self-destructive folly? If we are too oblivious to comfort other living creatures, be they trees or streams or our fellow human beings have we not lost our own claim on comfort and security? How can we dare to ask for God's comforting grace unless our honest, active, and effective repentance for our greed, and selfish cruelty make some attempt to comfort our anguished fellow beings? Yes, God's grace is free, unmerited, and promiscuous, but can we not reach beyond ourselves and even dare to offer some paltry and inadequate comfort to our heart-broken God, whose Advent we await?

I ask your prayers for peace in the life of the world; for a just use of the planet's resources; that the kingdom of God may be fulfilled

I ask your prayers for all who wield authority and influence, for the people of Ukraine and Russia, for leaders of nations who can shape war or peace.

Pray for all who exercise power. *Silence*

I ask your prayers, as the people called to love one another, for all whom we have wronged in action or neglect.

Pray for all who hate us. *Silence*

I ask your prayers for Bishop Kevin, for the Igreja Episcopal Anglicana do Brasil, for the congregations of Christ Church, Lanark, and St Paul and St John the Evangelist, Monklands; for the fostering of vocations and those who help to discern and develop them; and for all whom Christ has appointed to his service.

Pray for God's people. *Silence*

I ask your prayers for our communities, for schools and colleges, all students and staff; that our young people may have modelled the life of work and love.

Pray for our Communities. *Silence*

Give thanks to God for all in whom Christ has been honoured, who have modelled for us the way to wait with hope: for John Taylor, Bishop; for Eleanor Child and Kathleen Riding.

May they Rest in Peace, **and Rise in Glory**

Holy God, receive the prayers of your people as the time approaches, for You are our Hope in all things. **Amen.**

Lord of all ages,
world without end.
