11 - GOSPEL: Luke 3:1-6 - [AUDREY]

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. Glory to Christ our Saviour.

In the fifteenth year of the reign of Emperor Tiberius, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, and Herod was ruler[a] of Galilee, and his brother Philip ruler[b] of the region of Ituraea and Trachonitis, and Lysanias ruler[c] of Abilene, during the high-priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to

John son of Zechariah in the wilderness. He went into all the region around the Jordan, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins, as it is written in the book of the words of the prophet Isaiah,

'The voice of one crying out in the wilderness:

"Prepare the way of the Lord,

make his paths straight.

Every valley shall be filled,

and every mountain and hill shall be made low,

and the crooked shall be made straight,

and the rough ways made smooth;

and all flesh shall see the salvation of God."

Give thanks to the Lord for his glorious gospel **Praise to Christ our Lord.**

12 - Sermon [KELVIN]

Let me tell you a secret.

There's someone that I don't much like.

He's not someone I have to think about much. Occasionally I see his picture someplace or another and I just pass it by. I take no notice.

But then at this time of year, it seems as though I'm bumping into him all the time.

And when I do, I think to myself, "Well, I'm going to try to keep this to myself because everyone else seems to like you and I'm sure Jesus loves you but I'm afraid I don't."

Jesus loves everyone, I know. And I know I'm supposed to try to love everyone just like he does. But, well, I'm not the son of God and sometimes love just eludes me.

And this guy that I bump into at this time of the year – well there's just nothing about him that appeals.

He's relentlessly right about things.

He wears rough clothes and he has a sharp tongue. And even when he's not mouthing off at me, he's mouthing off at someone else. And he's just a little bit embarrassing to be seen with in public.

He has this sense of righteousness about him that ought to make him more attractive but the truth is, it doesn't.

He struggles to listen to people who are not as committed as he is.

He never knows when to stop making his point.

He's rude. Uncouth.

And I just don't like him.

It may seem irrational but I don't like him.

No, it is worse that. I can't stand him.

And the real trouble is, I've had enough therapy to know the obvious question to ask about this dislike.

I can imagine all too well a good counsellor looking at me and asking as though thinking of the idea for the very first time, "And is there anything, Kelvin about that this guy whom you don't like, anything about this John the Baptist chap that reminds you of yourself in any way."

And that question just makes me want to scowl and mutter about nests of vipers and call on my imaginary therapist to repent.

I guess I have to reluctantly admit that I've got reasons for not liking John the Baptist much.

But here he is – showing up right on schedule as usual at this time of year.

And there's no getting to the Christmas crib and angels and camels and shepherds and Magi and the babe in the manger and

all that without passing this way, and hearing what the Baptist has to say.

John the Baptist doesn't tend to shut up – a fact that got him into very deep trouble in the end.

But like him or not, there's no ignoring him.

I'll say some more about what he's saying to us this week in a minute. But let me commend my reflections on John the Baptist as a suitably dark spiritual exercise for Advent.

You can go on all kinds of pious prayerful spiritual experiences and be asked with whom you identify in a bible story in particular or with whom you identify in the bible in general. And there's nothing wrong with any of that.

But if that's old hat to you, try thinking about the biblical character you can't stand.

Who do you really not like?

And try to work out why.

Maybe there's insights to be had there too.

So what of what John the Baptist has to say today?

The gospel writer instinctively associates these prophetic words with John.

Every valley shall be filled, and every mountain and hill shall be made low, and the crooked shall be made straight, and the rough ways made smooth.

It isn't as though the gospel writers were listening to Handel's Messiah to themselves whilst writing either. They simply recognise that John was proclaiming loudly what previous prophets had suggested should happen when the actual Messiah was near.

This archetypical behaviour still goes on now too. When someone important is expected one of the first things that happens is that people fix the roads.

We had it here during COP26. When all the Important People. And Very Important People. And Very, Very Important People were flying (yes, flying, ironically) in and out of the climate change conference the roads needed to be fixed or even closed to lesser mortals and cleared completely.

Sorting out the royal processional way is an instinctive response to royalty.

(And it seems to be the same even when there are no monarchs involved).

And John the Baptist invites us to do just that with our lives today.

Fix the roads. Clear the pathways. Put right the potholes and repair the carriageway.

There's a king coming!

Get ready he says.

There's someone who is very, very important and they are just about to arrive.

- Turn things round.
- Repent of your sin.
- Sort your stuff out.

God is on the way.

Luke is really precise about when the word of the Lord came to John the Baptist. It was in the fifteenth year of the reign of Tiberius when Pontius Pilate was governor and Philip was ruling Ituraea and Annas and Caiaphas were the high priests. Luke wants to be very precise. At exactly that time, the word of the Lord came to John.

And he not only wanted to sort out everything for himself but sort out the inequalities and iniquities of the world around him.

When will the same word of the Lord come to you?

For, look out! There's a king coming.

The God of Love is at hand.

Time to get ready.

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

Through Jesus Christ our Lord, with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be to you, Lord of all ages, world without end.
