## Welcome - [KELVIN]

# The Ministry of the Word – second video

### GOSPEL: Matthew 25.1-13 – [MARION & HOUSEHOLD]

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mathew. Glory to Christ our Saviour.

"Then the kingdom of heaven will be like this. Ten bridesmaids" took their lamps and went to meet the bridegroom. Five of them were foolish, and five were wise. When the foolish took their lamps, they took no oil with them; but the wise took flasks of oil with their lamps. As the bridegroom was delayed, all of them became drowsy and slept. But at midnight there was a shout, 'Look! Here is the bridegroom! Come out to meet him.' Then all those bridesmaids got up and trimmed their lamps. The foolish said to the wise, 'Give us some of your oil, for our lamps are going out.' But the wise replied, 'No! there will not be enough for you and for us; you had better go to the dealers and buy some for yourselves.' And while they went to buy it, the bridegroom came, and those who were ready went with him into the wedding banquet; and the door was shut. Later the other bridesmaids came also, saying, 'Lord, lord, open to us.' But he replied, 'Truly I tell you, I do not know you.' Keep awake therefore, for you know neither the day nor the hour.

Give thanks to the Lord for his glorious Gospel. **Praise to Christ our Lord.** 

### Sermon [OLIVER]

By now, for many of us, things have had a chance to sink in. What we might have thought was a temporary inconvenience has become more permanent. What was a bad dream has become a lifestyle. Some will be angry. Some will be sad. Some will be anxious. Some will convince themselves this isn't so bad. We'll all have ways of understanding this situation and coping with it.

At first, my strategy was to put things on hold. I shifted my appointments and regular activities. 'This is only a momentary setback,' I thought, 'a temporary pause of life that soon would return to normal.' Those deferred deadlines, however, soon began to approach.

So, I found measures that would hold things together in the meantime, while I waited. I cobbled together ways to 'hack it'. It wasn't ideal, but it was something. However, as time moved on, some of those temporary solutions started to crack. My interim fixes would only hold for so long.

Consequently, I moved on to a 'making do' phase, finding ways of enduring a short-term inconvenience. 'Okay,' I told myself, 'this isn't great, but I'll put up with it for now.' It was the equivalent of holding one's breath while walking through a burning building. But there was only so long I could hold my breath.

Then, it was time for denial. I began ignoring the present mess, plying myself with dreams of the future. I put myself in a kind of holding pattern, feeding on the memories of the way things were, which I hoped would be again soon. (Does any of this sound familiar to you?)

As time's gone on, I've realised I'm growing tired of holding it together. I'm running out of fuel to keep up this charade. Too much has been on pause for too long. I'm starting to wonder how much longer the floodgates will hold. How much longer can I wait?

Today's Gospel talks about waiting. Ten bridesmaids were waiting for a delayed bridegroom. The story divides them into two groups—some who were wise and others who were foolish. Both brought lamps for a journey, but only one (the wise) brought oil for them. As I thought about this parable this week, I wondered about my journey of 2020. What had I brought with me to survive this wait? Was I carrying a torch? Or, was I just carrying an empty container?

I suspect a lot of us have been carrying something not fit for purpose over the last few months. It's the container we think we need for the events we've planned for, the things we hoped for. But things aren't the same; they're not as we expected. There's no fuel to pick up when we get to our destination. Our lamp doesn't work as it did before. Things aren't coming back the way we expected.

And yet, here we are: waiting. And it will be a longer wait still—a time without typical accommodations and resources, a time when we'll have to be on our own for a while, a time of uncertainty.

Fortunately, unlike the bridesmaids with no oil, it's not too late to do something—at least not yet. There's still time to go home or to the store to get some fuel. Even though things aren't as we expected, even though we don't know when things will change, we have an opportunity to live differently.

Many of us came into this pandemic preparing for the short term. I don't think we were foolish necessarily. I guess we were working with the worldview we had and the timescale that seemed manageable—something we could cope with. Maybe it is a lack of foresight, or perhaps it's something we didn't expect we'd have to ever deal with.

But we've got a lamp. It's time to fill it with oil. It's time to illuminate dark corners and uncover what's important—no more denial, no more stopgap measures, no more life on hold. It's time to be honest, to look at things as they are. It's time we made ourselves ready. It's time we turned on the lights. There's a celebration happening, and we've been invited.

God, whose very being is Community, you have called us to live faithful lives of connection and concern – and so, even though we may sometimes have no words, we hold in prayer the communities of our weary, frayed world.

Within the community of the Episcopal church we pray for Stephen Hazlett and the churches of St Mary's, Gatehouse of Fleet and Greyfriars Kirkcudbright; for Kevin our Bishop and all former members of St Mary's Cathedral; and in the wider Anglican communion for the Church in the Province of the West Indies and Bishop Howard Gregory; and we pray for the leaders of all faith communities as they seek ways forward in these times of restriction and restraints

God of Community, hear our prayer.

Within the community of frail and mortal humanity we pray for those who are unwell; for those who are weary or have lost sight of hope and joy; those who have died this week and those who mourn for them; for all those who have lost their lives in conflict and those who remember them; and, at their year's mind, for Eugenie Helen Brown, Robert John Evans, Raymond Swanson and Elizabeth Walker. May all the departed rest in peace and rise in joy.

God of Community, hear our prayer.

And we pray for ourselves - that we may continue to live, love, and serve faithfully and with hope, in the communities where you have set us.

Hear us, most merciful Father, and send your Holy Spirit upon us and upon this bread and this wine, that, overshadowed by his life-giving power, they may be the Body and Blood of your Son, and we may be kindled with the fire of your love and renewed for the service of your Kingdom.

Help us, who are baptised into the fellowship of Christ's Body to live and work to your praise and glory; may we grow together in unity and love until at last, in your new creation, we enter into our heritage in the company of the Virgin Mary, the apostles, and prophets, and of all our brothers and sisters living and departed.

Through Jesus Christ our Lord, with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be to you, Lord of all ages, world without end.
