GOSPEL: John 15:9-17 – [PETE]

Sermon [KELVIN]

I found myself counting down the days until the last relaxation of the covid regulations.

Each day another day nearer. And the thing that I wanted to do that I had not been able to do before that date was swim.

Three more days until the pool opens.

Two more days until the pool opens.

And I told everyone I was wanting to swim.

One more day until the pool opens.

And then it did.

And yes, getting back into the water was lovely. Up and down. Up and down. Stoke by stroke it felt as though something normal was being restored.

But the truth is, it wasn't just the swimming that I'd been counting down to. It was something else.

And it was the same last week, waiting to go up to Oban for the consecration of the new Bishop of Argyll and The Isles.

Three more days until the drive up to Oban.

Two more days, one more day.

And then the drive.

And yes, the service in the cathedral was really great and yes, Oban was very beautiful. But I hadn't been counting the days until I could eat fish and chips or counting the days until I could watch the sun set over the bay.

There was something more that I was looking forward to.

The swimming pond isn't just the place I go to for a swim. It is one of the places where I bump into friends. People who make me laugh. People who tell me their stories and people who listen to my own.

And the fish and chips were the best fish and chips and the sunset was the best of sunsets.

But it is that I ate them with my friends. And watched the sun set with my friends that made it so special.

That's what I'd been counting the days towards.

Covid has been a disrupter of so many things. And one of those things is our patterns of friendship.

And I'm glad that I've been able to keep up with my friends though walks in the park and on social media and on the phone and all that kind of thing. But I have enjoyed the joy of simply being with people on several occasions in the last week. Still socially distanced to some extent. But closer than we've been for a long, long time. Abiding with them, in the kind of words that Jesus uses.

As a single person, my friendships matter a very great deal and they are one of the strongest things that have enabled me to cope with covidtime.

And I know that I put friendship pretty high up on the scale of human relationships.

I've said before, many times, that I think that the church and the world would have been better if Christians had regarded Friendship as a primary sacrament rather than marriage and had built other models of relationship from that starting point.

In this week's gospel, Jesus seems to speak pretty highly about friendship too.

"I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends."

Friendship clearly matters.

And I know that for some, church is a primary place where they enjoy friendship. That's starting to come back now but, the social distancing still makes that difficult.

But if we can, let's let go of our own predicament for a moment and go back to Jess speaking to those around you.

There's something I find a bit odd about him saying that he calls them his servants no longer but now calls them his friends.

For, I'm not sure that I do read of him ever calling them his servants.

I have a suspicion that the writer of the fourth gospel is up to his usual tricks, playing around with time and circumstance to make a bigger theological statement.

Writing after the resurrection, after the events of Easter Day, he is remembering the kind of things that Jesus said and using them, years later, to describe what it all means.

John the gospel writer is an adept theological juggler sometimes. Grabbing things from here and there in a show of great and profound theological dexterity.

I don't think that he's simply talking about Jesus and the disciples here.

I think he's making the bigger point, that the relationship between God and human beings need not be about servants grovelling before a master but instead is more like friends enjoying one another's company.

I remember someone once trying to teach a group of people how to write good intercessions – and they said, "Try not to think of God as the Queen Mother".

What they meant was that if we always think of God as Your Majesty, we may be missing something important. Sure, there's a time and a place for being overwhelmed by the awesomeness of God's presence.

But Christianity is also about God sometimes opting to subvert that way of thinking entirely.

God came down to our level that we might be raised to God's level.

God came down to level with us that we might enjoy engaging with God.

In Jesus, God appeared in a form we could understand that we might enter into a relationship with all that is holy and all that is true.

And the nature of that relationship is friendship. Not being a servant or a subject.

Maybe you are wondering how to connect with God?

Well, maybe, you could start by asking yourself how you would connect with a friend. That might give you some clues. Think about that this week.

The world has felt very closed.

But the world is opening up again. There's the possibility for many of us of seeing and engaging with friends again in ways that haven't been possible for a long time.

Remember, the world of God is already open.

It always has been.

People call those who follow our way of live Christians. But Jesus never called anyone a Christian. He called them friends.

And he loved them. And he loves them still.

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.
