Hello and welcome to this service from St Mary's Cathedral, Glasgow.

Gospel

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John. Glory to Christ our Saviour.

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. They said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping?' She said to them, 'They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him.' When she had said this, she turned round and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping? For whom are you looking?' Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, 'Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away.' Jesus said to her, 'Mary!' She turned and said to him in Hebrew, 'Rabbouni!' (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, 'Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, "I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." ' Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, 'I have seen the Lord'; and she told them that he had said these things to her.

Sermon [KELVIN]

Christ is risen!

He is risen indeed! Alleluia

This Easter sees us celebrating the news of the resurrection in a new way. Usually it is one of the busiest days of the year in St Mary's and the church is packed. We rejoice in having to bring in extra chairs and print extra service sheets.

This year, the church itself is silent. No organ music. No choral music. No triumphant alleluias ring out in that place.

But Christ rose on a quiet morning, not to fanfares and not to large crowds either.

He appeared in places where disciples found themselves. In a garden at first. On a road as people walked next. In people's own homes.

We are specifically told that he appeared in the homes of his followers who had shut their doors and locked them because of fear.

We have unexpected connections this year with that first Easter and we will experience and hear the good news of Jesus's resurrection differently to any year that we've heard it before. And it will change us (for it always does change us) but change us in ways that we never could have expected.

Christ is risen from the dead. And instead of us turning up to greet him, the news this day is that he is with each of us wherever we are. And the Easter gospel comes to us in our homes and in essential places of work. And the news is that death is not the end. That new life is not just possible but inevitable. The news is firm and true – that Lamentation has its place but Alleluia will ultimately down it out.

For those of us who normally gather at Easter in St Mary's, perhaps this year is a wake up call. In different times and different places people have celebrated Easter. Christ has risen from the grave when people have been at war and at the front line. Christ has risen from the grave when people have been in prison. Christ has risen from the grave when refugees have been fleeing for safety. And people have encountered the good news in the trenches or in the prison cell or on the long road to freedom that Christ is risen from the grave. New life is not our hope. It is our destiny.

And God especially loves those who can scarcely dare to dream that the resurrection can be true.

The image of Easter this year which has caught my eye is Jesus meeting Mary Magdelene in the garden in one of our paintings. It happens just by the River Kelvin. But that's not why it has caught my eye. It is because Mary Magdelene gets to understand first amongst the disciples that her beloved Lord is risen from the grave. She tries to grab hold of him but he says, "Do not touch me yet". *Nole me tangere.* This is surely the Easter of *noli me tangere.* Do not touch me yet.

We are not able to be together. We cannot share the peace or even share communion in one place at the moment. But we will once more.

The news that matters is that Christ is risen from the grave. Do not touch me yet he says to Mary in her confusion and bewilderment. But she is in no doubt that he is risen and walks through the world bringing anew his message that everything wrong will be righted and every tear will be wiped from every eye.

New life. New joy. New ways of learning of God's love. Right here. Right now. Right where you are.

For if Christ were not risen from the dead, we would not be finding new ways to gather to meet him. Now, here in my home, there wherever you are and to the uttermost parts of the earth!

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

Praise and thanksgiving be to you, Lord of all, for by the Cross eternal life is ours and death is swallowed up in victory. In the first light of Easter glory broke from the tomb and changed the women's sorrow into joy. From the Garden the mystery dawned that he whom they had loved and lost is with us now in every place for ever. Making himself known in the breaking of the bread, speaking peace to the fearful disciples, welcoming weary fishermen on the shore, he renewed the promise of his presence and of new birth in the Spirit who sets the seal of freedom on your sons and daughters.

Before he was given up to suffering and death, recalling the night of Israel's release, the night in which slaves walked free, at supper with his disciples he took bread and offered you thanks. He broke the bread. and gave it to them, saying: "Take, eat. This is my Body: it is broken for you." After supper, he took the cup, he offered you thanks, and gave it to them saying: "Drink this, all of you. This is my Blood of the new covenant; it is poured out for you, and for all, that sins may be forgiven. Do this in remembrance of me."

We now obey your Son's command. We recall his blessed passion and death, his glorious resurrection and ascension; and we look for the coming of his Kingdom. Made one with him, we offer you these gifts and with them ourselves, a single, holy, living sacrifice.

Hear us, most merciful Father, and send your Holy Spirit upon us and upon this bread and this wine, that, overshadowed by his life-giving power, they may be the Body and Blood of your Son, and we may be kindled with the fire of your love and renewed for the service of your Kingdom.

Help us, who are baptised into the fellowship of Christ's Body to live and work to your praise and glory; may we grow together in unity and love until at last, in your new creation, we enter into our heritage in the company of the Virgin Mary, the apostles, and prophets, and of all our brothers and sisters living and departed.

Through Jesus Christ our Lord, with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be to you, Lord of all ages, world without end.
