The signs and symbols that we have used before will be different to the signs and symbols that we use this year. There will be some things that are familiar. And there will be things that feel new and fresh. I keep reminding myself that it is what those signs and symbols point to which matters. And we will be taken to the things which matter more than anything else in the world as we keep these three days together.

Gospel

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John. Glory to Christ our Saviour.

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come

from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, 'Lord, are you going to wash my feet?' Jesus answered, 'You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand.' Peter said to him, 'You will never wash my feet.' Jesus answered, 'Unless I wash you, you have no share with me.' Simon Peter said to him, 'Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!' Jesus said to him, 'One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you.' For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, 'Not all of you are clean.'

After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, 'Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord—and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them.'

When he had gone out, Jesus said, 'Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, "Where I am going, you cannot come." I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.'

Give thanks to the Lord for his glorious Gospel.

Sermon [OLIVER]

Brace yourselves. This evening I plan to talk about something that will make some of you uncomfortable. This could be a talk that puts you right off. It might make one or two among us ask whether or not what I'm going to talk about is even an appropriate subject to talk about in church.

Tonight, I will talk about ... feet.

Many people have issues with feet. Research last year from foot-care brand Scholl revealed one in three people said they were embarrassed by their feet. Things like blisters, corns, ingrown toenails, athlete's foot, fungal nail infections, bunions, and excessive foot odour affect all kinds of people.

Feet take a beating through the course of our lives. Lorraine Jones from The College of Podiatry reminds us, 'Feet are one of the hardest working parts of the body.' They show the miles we've walked, the places to which we've travelled, the gyms and public pools we've showered in, and the shoes we've worn.

And many of us aren't happy with the effects these things have had on our feet—the marks they've left and the impairments they've left us with. So, it's a good thing—a lot of folks think—that we wear shoes. Keep those tootsies covered up!

The issues folk have with feet aren't new. In ancient times—with some wearing sandals and other poorer folk going without any foot covering at all—feet contended directly with the dust and dirt of the road, poisonous insects and snakes, sharp rocks, animal droppings and the waste products of human beings.

Feet made up-close-and-personal contact with the environment. They weren't the sort of thing that, after a long day of walking around, you'd expect to be clean. In fact, people probably found it necessary to wash their feet repeatedly every day. In the Bible, we

read about certain customs surrounding the washing of feet, especially when entering homes. It was a sign of hospitality, and, usually, the lowest servants in a household got this job—and perhaps it's no wonder why.

So, when Peter tells Jesus he doesn't want Jesus to wash his feet, many of us might understand where he's coming from. We say, 'I'll deal with my feet in private, thanks.'

Of course, there are all kinds of things like feet ... things we're not eager to expose. We don't want to share the bits of us that are vulnerable and sensitive. Giving over the smelliest, potentially dirtiest parts of us isn't something a lot of people feel comfortable doing. But in tonight's gospel, Jesus asks to have something to do with those very bits.

On the eve of his Passion, when things are about to get really ugly—Jesus tells us that it isn't some sanitised version of relationship he's offering. Jesus' actions indicate a kind of relationship that deals directly with the unpleasant, the wounded and battered bits of life. And, anything other than that kind of honest, real relationship isn't worth pursuing—not with Jesus.

It's an uncomfortable ask: to allow Jesus or someone else to touch our feet (or whatever part of us that we feel isn't okay, or clean enough), to give someone access to the malfunctioning pieces, the things we're ashamed of, the stuff that smells; to give over the ailing and aching parts of us, and to come just as we are: with all the distorted bits, with bulges and bends, marked and worn, displaying mistreatment and disregard. But, this—this injured and awful way—is how Jesus has revealed himself to us. And he's got the marks that show it. All you have to do to see them ... is look at his feet.

On this night, he reminded them that if the world hated them, it hated him first. We pray for those who are persecuted for their faith.
